### A Summer Letter from the Rector, Revd Ian Welch:

# Dear Fríends,

One of the most important Marian celebrations, the Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary, falls during the Summer holiday period, on 15th August. This timing perhaps explains why the Festival is not given the attention it merits, given the hugely important role Mary plays in the Christian story of redemption. This relative neglect has not always been the case.

Devotion to Mary and belief in the efficacy of her intercessory prayers goes back to the early days of the Christian church. Gregory of Nazianzus (329-389) for example, known as the 'theologian', records the fact that many believers sought her protection in their prayers. Her cult as the 'Mother of God' (Theotokos) became so strong, that in the medieval period her name was often used at the conclusion of prayers in commonly used service books, in place of that of Jesus Christ. This high esteem for Mary led ultimately to the doctrine of 'the Immaculate Conception', since her dignity as the mother of God meant that she must, according to traditional theology, have all the purity, gentleness and perfection of character possible for a human being.

Whatever one's particular view on the Immaculate Conception, Mary is understood by all Christians to have played a vital part in our redemption, since she is the mother of the author all grace; it is she who makes Christ's mission on Earth possible. As a consequence of this central role in salvation history, Mary, without being divine, comes as close to divinity as it is possible for a human to be, and hence her veneration and mediatory role in Christian prayer and worship.

Popular devotions to Mary include the prayers of the Rosary, as an accompaniment to which strings of beads are used as an aid to memory, and the singing of that lovely hymn, the Angelus, at the end of Mass, as well as pilgrimages to Lourdes and many other locations. Her great vocation, to bring forth the redeemer from her womb, makes her the source of spiritual life and regeneration for all who find their way to Christ as redeemer. Hence she is the Mother of mercy and infinite compassion, and the one we turn to in times of need.

As the Mother of the all-compassionate Saviour, she teaches us to have compassion for one another and for ourselves. It is then fitting, that her Festival falls at a time of the year when many are seeking rest, refreshment and renewal. In her humble acceptance of God's will – of his gentleness towards our frail and wayward humanity – she exemplifies a humility and gentleness of spirit that all may look up to. This gentleness extends, of course, to ourselves as well as to others. With this in mind, whatever your plans for the late Summer period may be, whether you stay at home or travel to pastures new, it is fitting to seek out activities that refresh and renew our energies. This refreshment enables us to provide appropriate care and gentleness for the soul, and indeed to return in the Autumn to our familiar tasks with energy, zest and enthusiasm.

May Mary's gentleness, protection and grace accompany you in all things!

Dot became secretary to the Group Council as it was then called on the 9th of April 1963 and served for a grand total of 14 years until 1977. She then remained involved by helping the 16th Royal Eltham Scout Group organise local Fetes, Donkey Derbies and Jumble Sales etcetera. As a matter if interest the Donkey Derby was the Scouts biggest yearly fund raiser, providing enough to cover our expenses for a year. Many of you may also remember the Derby was held at the District HQ in New Eltham each May time. Both the 16th and the 3rd Royal Eltham benefitted to the tune of up to £1000 each.
